Optimism Grounded in Hope

"I am fundamentally an optimist," said antiapartheid leader Nelson Mandela. "Part of being optimistic is keeping one's head pointed toward the sun, one's feet moving forward. There were many dark moments when my faith in humanity was sorely tested, but I would not and could not give myself up to despair."

Some say optimism is naïve, "a generic good idea about the future" (Walter Brueggermann, *Reverberations of Faith*), and distinguish it from hope. But Mandela's 27 years in prison and other sufferings would indicate that, in his case, optimism is anchored in deep hope.

Our hope is grounded in God's power to bring life from death, primarily in Jesus' resurrection, and in other acts of deliverance. God brings joy from sorrow, healing from brokenness, love from hate. We can't fathom what goodness awaits us down the road (Could Mandela, in prison, imagine becoming South Africa's first black president?!), so we keep looking up and moving forward. Such optimism is rooted in profound hope — and is a gift of God.

When God Crosses Our Paths

Pastor and martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "God will be constantly crossing our paths and canceling our plans by sending us people with claims and petitions." Last spring, the whole world had plans canceled, first by Covid-19 and then by God "sending us people with claims and petitions." Some needed prayers for healing or for coping with grief. Medical staff, teachers, pastors and others serving long hours needed support: meals, check-in calls, "thinking of you" cards. Parents working remotely while helping kids with distance-learning needed encouragement. Crucial nonprofit work still required donations.

Pre-pandemic, you may not have realized that staying home or wearing a face mask could be a ministry. Or that sending a card expresses love in Jesus' name. Or that buying takeout from a local restaurant can be a gift to the owners. When our calendars empty, God "crosses our paths" in new ways — both to be with us and to nudge us toward others (even if virtually, or six feet apart!).

Always Within Reach

As I grow older, I appreciate help getting up from the couch. Often, my husband extends his arm to boost me up. This act of kindness reminds me how the Lord reaches out to me each morning. He

is the strength to lift me up, so I needn't depend on myself.

Looking back through the years, I can see how the Lord endlessly extended His arm to me. Isaiah 33:2 says, "O LORD, be gracious to us; we wait for You. Be our arm every morning, our salvation in the time of trouble." Too often I haven't waited for the Lord, and my impatience resulted in no-good results. Waiting for — and accepting — God's guidance isn't always easy, but He always comes through, and we're never out of his reach.

I'm so thankful my heavenly Father graciously extends His arm to help me up, get me "unstuck" and keep me from trouble.

Words from Rev. Tom Bower

"When things don't go according to plan!" You've heard that before. Can you remember things in your life that turned out quite differently than you had planned or hoped for? I'm sure that we could all tell stories, especially related to 2020.

"The best made plans of mice and men go awry." That proverb comes from a Scottish poem written by Robert Burns. It signifies the futility of making detailed plans when the ability to fully or even partially execute them is uncertain. For the Christian believer, we might prefer the words of Proverbs 16: 9, "In his heart a man plans his course, but the Lord determines his steps."

All of which is to say: In our topsy-turvy world, we need to be flexible, pliable, moldable, malleable, stretchable, and resilient. We could add a few other words too, but you get the point. Change is the name of the game. And yet, we need to be people who are stable, stand our ground, have firm beliefs and convictions, and are able and willing to stand up for the right. Ephesians 6 tells us to "Stand firm with the belt of truth buckled around your waist."

So, we walk that tightrope – planning ahead and planning as thoroughly as possible while, at the same time, being open to new things and flexible about old things. As Christians we can have the confidence that our lives and times are in HIS hands and He will not leave us or forsake us. We press on together as staff and congregation of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, especially mindful of our dear pastor, Rich King.

AUGUST SESSION ACTIONS

The Stated Session meeting of First Presbyterian Church, Marshalltown, met via Zoom, August 18, 2020.

Moderator Rev. Tom Bower opened the Session meeting at 7:05 p.m. with prayer. Lynne Bovenmyer presented the devotions and prayer.

There was a quorum in attendance.

Motion prevailed to approve the July 21, 2020 Stated Session minutes as printed.

Staff reports were presented.

Finances: Matt Broshar presented the financials. Due to the Coronavirus, the church is still closed since the middle of March. Giving is below last year's giving and below the budget. Spending is also below budget. Many people continue to mail their donations to the church and people are encouraged to continue to mail their faith pledge to the church. Some interest has been earned on the church investments.

Finance/Stewardship: No report.

Mission/Evangelism: Matt Broshar reported the committee is working on three Presbytery grants at \$1,500 each like those we've received previously at \$3,000 each. Motion prevailed to request a \$1,500 each grant from Presbytery for Wells for Sudan, Jonathan's House lunch program in Central African Republic and MorningStar Missions in Honduras. Dave Freel reminded people to support taking evening meals to the King family. They are looking at doing some clean-up work at the King home following the storm and are helping clean-up Mavis Gray's trees and yard. They want to get a group to help clean up things around the church grounds. They will discuss this with Jon Rottink and Don Feld, Property Committee chairman, for things they need to have

Worship & Music: Wynona Anderson reported the outdoor service they'd planned at Grimes Farm was cancelled due to the derecho storm and so many trees down there. Real bouquets of flowers are being used on the altar since people have signed up to sponsor them. The Deacons are encouraged to come get the bouquets and take to someone.

The sub-committee continues to meet to determine a safe way to proceed with reopening the church. The committee is not ready to open the church for Sunday services.

Christian Ed: Doug Bacon reported that Sunday school continues on-line. They are discussing how they can do Wednesday Club in the fall.

A & P: Richie Ritter reported and discussed reopening the church. Richie is contacting all the staff to see how they are doing. He will meet with Pastor Tom Bower to finalize paperwork on his contract to preach at the church for three months while Pastor Rich King recuperates from a stroke. He will meet with Rich and Valerie King to get their input and update regarding Rich's recuperation.

Membership & Involvement: No report.

Property: Don Feld reported two of the air conditioners on the Gathering Place were blown over during the derecho and Ethington's was called to get the air conditioners set upright and restarted. They changed filters in the furnaces in the Gathering Place. Cowan's Roofing has been contacted to look at the church and Gathering Place roofs. Don has installed a foot pedal on the inside of the bathroom doors by Fellowship Hall, so people don't have to touch the door handles when leaving the bathrooms. They discussed applying for a \$5,000 grant from Presbytery. Motion prevailed to have the committee apply for the \$5,000 grant from Presbytery. Don will contact Jeannie Stolee at the N. Central lowa Presbytery office to get more information and fill out the grant application.

Motion prevailed to keep the church closed until the September 15, Session meeting. A week or two will be needed before the church is opened for training of ushers and greeters. The group will continue to meet weekly on Wednesdays at 7 p.m. via Zoom until they are able to open the church safely.

Other: Purchasing a four-channel system to project the services in the Fellowship Hall was left on the table to be discussed at a future Session meeting.

Rev. Tom Bower closed the meeting with prayer at 8:15 p.m.
